






## ABOUT

This little black book presents Arabic font Arabet together with an introduction to basic Arabic language rules which can help you with learning Arabic.



## **ARABET**

Is a font that contains elements from handwriting and also carries necessities to be generally legible for beginners for purposes to learn Arabic. It is designed in an easy monolinear style that tends to be geometric yet still derives some characteristics of the author's handwriting.






















Alif is the first letter of the Arabic alphabet and represents the long vowel 'aa'. It's only joinable from the right side – that means there are only two forms of the letter – isolated and final.

It is pronounced like 'b' in the English word 'bat'. Pay attention to the dot position.





It is pronounced like 't' in the English word 'tap'. Pay attention to the position of the dots
- it is the only difference between TAA and BAA letters and other similar letters.

It is pronounced like 'th' in the English word 'thin' or 'thesis'. Pay attention to the letters BAA, TAA, and THAA and where the dots are positioned.






It is pronounced like 'j' in the English word 'juice'. It has other possible pronunciation (but less common) used for example in Egyptian Arabic – it is like 'g' in the English word 'gap'.






There is no sound equivalent in English for this letter. It sounds like a strong breathy 'h'. Try to pronounce it from the back of your throat.





It sounds like 'ch' in the English pronunciation of music composer 'Bach' or like Scottish 'Loch Ness'. Pay attention to the letters JIIM, 'HA, and KHA.






It sounds like 'd' in the English word 'dad'. It can only connect from the right side – there is only an isolated and a final form.




It sounds like 'th' in the English word 'that'. It can only connect from the right side – there is only an isolated and a final form.





It sounds like 'r' in the English pronunciation of the city 'Rome'. It can only connect from the right side – there is only an isolated and a final form.










Zaay or zayn sounds like 'z' in the English word 'zebra'. It can only connect from the right side – there is only an isolated and a final form.



It sounds like 's' in the English word 'sea'.












It sounds like 'sh' in the English word 'sheep'.



Emphatic letter "S'. It has no direct equivalent in English. It is pronounced from the back of your mouth. Try to first pronounce the English word 'sun' while stressing the letter 's'. Do not mistake with letter SIIN.





Strong emphatic "D'. Try to first pronounce the English word 'dome' with stress on 'd'. Remember that non-emphatic 'd' is for the letter DAL.



Another emphatic letter – bold stressed "T'.
Try again to pronounce it from the back of your mouth. It is different than the sound of 't' used for the letter TAA.




Emphatic letter "Z' (sounds almost like 'D'). Try again to pronounce it from the back of your mouth. There is a deeper sound of 'z' than in the letter ZAAY.













isolated – initial – medial – final





It has a harsh guttural sound of 'a' - a'yin produced from the back of the throat. It sounds almost like 'ae' with stress on 'e'. There is no sound equivalent in English and it takes a lot of practice to master it.
















It sounds like 'f' in the English word 'foot'.

It sounds like 'k' from the back of your throat. Pay attention to the letter FAA and QAAF. QAAF has two dots above and in its isolated and final form, it has a curled ending that goes below the line. FAA has only one dot and lies on the line.









## Letter LAAM

It sounds like a soft 'l' in the English word 'lamp'.





When the letter LAAM comes before ALIF in a word, it must be written in a new unique ligature form. It's a letter combining two letters LAAM and ALIF.











It sounds like 'm' in the English word 'mustard'.





It sounds like 'n' in the English word 'near'.





It is pronounced like 'h' in the English word 'house'. Be careful to distinguish the sound from the similar letter 'HA which has a more breathy sound and comes from the back of your throat.



pyramid – [haram]

The letter WAAW has two possible pronunciations – like 'w' in the English surprise expression 'wow' or long vowel 'oo'.
