Final Comments & Questions

This is a wonderful thesis that explores the implications of the students' years of study for the teaching of English in Czech classroom, with emphasis on literature and New Englishes. I was convinced by the thesis at every turn: from the excellent overview of theoretical writing, to the formulation of the research questions, and the student's reflection on the results and the limitations of the research. I appreciated the post-reading task in which the students wrote a comic that cast themselves as the protagonist. This focalizes larger theoretical issues in concrete situations, and also encourages students' creativity.

At some points (e.g., 35), I wondered whether the student wasn't setting up a zero-sum game between Inner Circle Englishes and ELF. Students may think that abandoning, say, British or US English means learning another particular variety (that is less prestigious), or several of these, which they naturally resist. The majority disagree with the statement "I would on different varieties on English in lessons." From classroom interactions with the student, I'm aware that she sees the issue in more a complex manner. This could have been rephrased as, say: "I would like to focus on varieties of English that are used in Europe." European ELF seems to be emerging as a new variety, and this will be used by most the students in the future.

Overall, I read this thesis with great interest, and it would be of great use if more research like this was carried out.

One small issue: is "basic" the best translation for "základní" in education? Would not "primary" be better? (I'm aware that some Czech framework documents use "basic".)

I recommend the grade of 1/výborně for this thesis.
